[Arrangement of 1870.]



John Buzard a pensioner of the United States by certificate  
dated the 21<sup>st</sup> of July 1819 at eight dollars per month came  
personally into the Court being a party of Record and  
delivered a schedule of his estate which he first valued  
at \$125.33<sup>3</sup>/<sub>8</sub> cents and to which the said Buzard made  
certain alterations agreeable to the Law. Wherefore it is ordered that  
the said schedule and oath be returned and certified  
to wit: "On this 25<sup>th</sup> day of February 1820 personally  
appeared in open Court being a party of Record for the  
Whitcomb Judicial District of Kentucky by the Common  
Law Statute Law of this State John Buzard aged  
forty four years residing in Putnam County who being  
first sworn according to law doth in his oath declare  
that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows: He  
enlisted in Captains Andrew Maspons' Company 12<sup>th</sup> Virginia  
Regiment Commanded by Col. John Stennis in August 1776  
and from Pittsburg he marched to Fort Catawba and  
from thence he marched again to Pittsburg from thence  
to Mincholia and thence to Philadelphia and joined the  
Main Army Commanded by General Washington and then  
marched to Brandywine where he was in the engagement  
of the 11<sup>th</sup> of September 1777 called the Battle of  
Brandywine from thence he marched to the Paoli and  
was in the battle or massacre at the Paoli Commanded by  
Lieut. Wayne and then he marched to German Town  
where he was in the Battle of German Town and continued  
in the service until the 10<sup>th</sup> day of April 1778 when he  
was discharged - The number of his Pension is 14 1/4 and  
the date of his original application is the 21<sup>st</sup> day of  
July 1819. And I do solemnly swear that I was a Resident  
Citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818  
and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in  
any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof  
with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself  
within the provision of an act of Congress entitled and

An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land  
naval service of the United States passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day  
of March 1815. And that I have not nor has any one in  
trust for me any property or security, contract, or debt  
due me (nor have I any) income other than that is  
contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and subscribed  
by me to wit: 1 Horse 11 years old - 1 Heifer 10 years  
old. 1 Heifer 6 years old - two Cows and one Calf  
one Kieper, one yearling Calf. One sow & pig - 11 head  
of sheep. one Barbican plow. one pair of axes  
one sawing and one mattock. one Cornish Dowl  
Cupboard and two Wreeding keys.

The Declarant is by Occupation a farmer. He has  
lost the sight of his right eye and is very much reduced  
in strength. His wife is aged sixty four years, her health  
is not good - He has living with him two Children, the  
eldest a Daughter aged 22 years, yet single, the other  
a son named Philip aged 16 years, and has been a cripple  
from his birth by not having the use of his right  
Arm, and right leg and is of unsound mind. sworn to  
and declared before 20<sup>th</sup> of February 1834

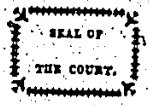
JUDICIAL OF Kentucky, ss.

On this 21<sup>st</sup> day of July 1819, before me, the subscriber, one of the Judges of the Circuit Court of the State aforesaid for the said district, personally appeared John Bryan aged 62 years, resident in Jefferson County in the said district, who, being by me first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war:" That he, the said Bryan enlisted for the term of eighteen months on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of October in the year 1776 in the state of Vt in the company commanded by Captain Andrew Waggoner of the Regiment commanded by Colonel John Neville in the line of the State of Virginia on the Continental Establishment; that he continued to serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States, until the full 10<sup>th</sup> April 1778, when he was discharged from service in Valley Forge state of Vt that he was in the battles of Braunspine, Germantown & Red Bank

and that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support; and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services.  
Sworn to and declared before me, the day and year aforesaid.

John P. Albright Judge, &c. as aforesaid, do certify that it appears, to my satisfaction, that the said John Bryan did serve in the revolutionary war, as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy, for the term of nine months, at one time, on the continental establishment; and I now transmit the proceedings and testimony taken and had before me, to the Secretary for the Department of War, pursuant to the directions of the aforementioned, act of Congress. I am also satisfied that he needs the assistance of his country for support.

Given under my hand and seal this 21<sup>st</sup> day of July 1819.

Also appeared before me Lewis Cooper  
and made oath that he knew the said Beuzan  
in the service & saw him at Fort Pitt in April 1777  
in Capt. Waggoners company and saw <sup>him</sup> again in  
November 1777 at Whitemanish - that he was married  
a neighbor with the s<sup>d</sup> Beuzan; and has no doubt  
of his full service for <sup>several</sup> months - through  
which he died the Wednesday of July 1819 -
