Do it remembered that on this twen-
tith day of August in the year one thousand
eight hundred and nineteen, before the undersigned
one of the judges of the General Court and a Circuit
Judge of the State aforesaid, personally appeared
William Leavelle, a resident and citizen of Pul-
kit county in the State aforesaid aged about fifty
nine years - and being duly sworn in the law clerk,
made the following declaration and statement, to
obtain from Government a pension for revolutionary
soldier's services to the Act of Congress entitled
"An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the
land and Naval service of the United States, in the
revolutionary war" to wit, that in the month
of September 1780 he enlisted for eight months
under Capt. Grant, and was attached to the regi-
ment of the Virginia line commanded by Colonel
Campbell, the members of the regiment not re-
called - the enlistment took place at Spotsylvania
near Fredericksburg in Virginia, that he contin-
ued in said regiment faithfully until the month of
June 1781 - when he applied for and obtained leave
of his officers to enlist during the war in the Cavalry
and in that month he did in South Carolina
he did enlist during the war in the company of
Dragoons commanded by Captain Anderson Gordon
and was attached to the third regiment of Dragoons
of the Virginia line in Continental establishment
commanded by Colo. George Young and Lieut.
Colo. William Warrington, that he continued
to serve in said corps faithfully during the
war, and was honorably discharged with in
the month of June or July 1783 by Capt. Peter
Almon by the order as he believes of Genl. Daniel
Morgan, at Lexington about three miles from

Winchester in Virginia, which discharge he lost shortly afterwards, and cannot produce it, that he is truly poor, & has no estate and depends upon the bounty of his connections for his support in his old age - That about the last of April or first of May 1818 he made a similar declaration to the foregoing before the late Hon. Alfred Mitchell one of the Circuit Judges of this State which declaration was forwarded to the War Department, by mail & no answer has been received from it; nor can he hear or find out what has become of said declaration. So that he is compelled to make the foregoing statement again.

Also Charles A. Cal again about fifty eight years appeared before me at the same time and place and being duly sworn did depose and say, that he belonged to Colo. Washington's Regiment of Light Dragoons, and was entitled in it, and during the time of his service, the afore named William Leadeville resided therein during the war, in 1811 and served faithfully in said Regiment until the close of the war to the knowledge of this deponent who belonged to the same company, and said Leadeville at the close of the war was honorably discharged at the same time this deponent ^{was} June the 12. June 1813 at that he knows said Leadeville is now infirmed and unable to labor & that he is truly in such indigent circumstances as to require the aid of his country for his support.

Also John Jacobs sworn at the same time did depose and say that he knows that the afore named Applicant William Leadeville was a soldier in

September Term 1870

William Cardwell a pensioner of the United States by Certificate dated the 27th day of October 1819 at eight dollars per month came personally into the Court being a Court of Record and returned a Schedule of his Estate which the Court valued at \$18.25 cents and to which the said Cardwell made oath agreeably to law. Whereupon it is ordered that the said Schedule of debts be recorded & certified (to wit) "On the 25th day of September 1870 personally appeared in open Court being a Court of Record for the County of Putnam by the Commandant Detachment (law) of this State William Cardwell aged 61 years residing in said County who being first sworn according to said oath on his oath declared that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows. He entered in Capt. Morris's Company in the year 1780 and served 9 months in the 8th Regiment Commanded by Col. Campbell all of the Virginia line on the Continental establishment. In the year 1781 he went to South Carolina and on the 2^d entered in the Army of the Revolution during the War Cap. Robert Morrison who was attached to the left Flank service Commanded by Lieutenant Col. Williams Mackintosh in which Regiment was Major Call. He was discharged at Kerns Cross in July 1783. The number of his Pension is 15 1/8 and the date of his original application was on the day of April 1818. And I do solemnly swear that I was a Resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818. And that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an Act of Congress entitled an act to provide for persons engaged in the land and naval services of the United States passed on the 18th day of March 1818. And that I have not nor has any one in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained

in the schedule herunto annexed and by me subscribed
wit. One bed \$15. One pair \$12. One Horse \$15. 12
head of hog \$12. And Kettle \$2. And Iron \$2. And Copper
\$2. 50. 1 pair Chair \$2. one 2d Kettle 5 cents. Saxes
\$2. 1 Cooking Rod \$1. making altogether the sum of
\$66. 25 cents. The Deponent is by occupation a farmer.
His wife is age 61 years. He has been considerably failing
in strength for five or six years past. He has living
with him two children. He has in all 9 children
five boys & four daughters. Two of them are married
and all are as healthy as men and women commonly
are. He was in the Battle of Guilford under the
Command of Col. Campbell, belonging to the Company of
Capt. Grant. He was wounded in that Battle by a
glancing wound on the leg of no serious injury.

Satisfactory proof was this day made to the Court that Penneriah Cardwell deceased, late of said County of Jefferson, widow of William Cardwell deceased, late of Bullitt County, Kentucky, who was a Revolutionary Pensioner under the act of Congress of the United States of the 7th day of July 1836, departed this life on the 8th day of May 1843 at said County of Jefferson, and that the following persons are her only surviving children, (to wit) Elizabeth Shirley, who is seventy six years of age, John Cardwell, who is sixty five years of age, and George Cardwell, who is fifty nine years of age.

On this Eleventh day of ^{March} February 1839 came Tamara
Cardwell widow of William Cardwell dec'd before me David L Brooks
Justice Peace for said County of State, who being first sworn according
to Law, states that she was married to her deceased husband
Wm Cardwell in Culpepper County Virginia in 1781, as she con-
fidently believes but she cannot remember the month or day, that
they had the marriage of both of registered in a family Bible
and that some number of years ago her son William Cardwell
tore out of & from the same nearly all the Record evidence -
tearing out the Record of her age marriage &c and she has
since that time forgotten the persons names - she states that
she has employed George F. Phipps Esq and also Noah C Summers
to write to the office in 2^d County of Culpepper Virginia for the
Record of their marriages - she has rec^d for answer from both
of them that they have written & cannot get any response
although they first wrote last fall - she states she is poor &
cannot find means to send a special messenger to Virginia or she would
do so to try & find the records - she states that the ages of two of
her children are recorded in the family Bible & was some long
since by the direction of the s^r William Cardwell her husband
brought her fourth and Eleventh children - that she has had
Eleven children viz Nancy ^{1st} now the widow of ~~William~~
Brown, Elizabeth ^{2nd} now widow of Robert Shively, Benjamin
3rd (decd) Lewis the fourth son recorded in the Bible born the
(25 December 1785) Twenty fifth of December Seventeen
hundred & Eighty five - William (the 5th son) Susan (6th)
wife of Joel W Shively, James 7th married ~~Wm~~ & is
decd - George (8th) John (9th) Mary (10th) married
Melis Watson - Edmund the Eleventh son, recorded
in the Bible born first of November Eighteen hundred
Eons (1 Nov^r 1801) decd - she states that she
does not now remember of any of her old friends living
that can prove her marriage - she had shortly since
some bonds, Wm Casey & Philip Ganey of Franklin County Ky

and John Story some where in N.Y., who knows the fact - but she does not more know whether, and if so, where they live, she states, the Chlarians ages, as recorded in the Bible she believes strictly correct - and that the facts are as strong as ought to be deemed necessary as far as dates of marriage - she cannot but hope that enough is shown in law & Justice to permit a speedy allowance of her claim - as she is quite old & feeble, and will not much longer require the aid of her Government - she is poor, & request a speedy reply -

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of William Cardwell and his widow, Famariah Hughes Cardwell, both of whom received pensions, File No. 8590.

A very careful search of the papers in Revolutionary War pension claim, W.8590, based upon the military service of William Cardwell in that war, has been made in your behalf and the data found therein is given below.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of William Cardwell are not shown in the papers in pension claim.

He enlisted at Spotsylvania, Virginia, in September, 1779, for eighteen months, served in Captains Armistead's, Harris' and Crane's Companies, Colonel William Campbell's Virginia Regiment; re-enlisted and served as a sergeant in Captains Ambrose Gordon's and Robert Morrow's Companies, Colonels George Baylor's and William Washington's 3rd regiment of Light Dragoons and was discharged June 1, 1783 or June 12, 1783. He was in the battles of the Cowpens, Guilford, where he received a wound in the leg and Camden.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 20, 1819, at which time he was aged about fifty-nine years and resided in Bullitt County, Kentucky.

He died March 1, 1833, place not stated.

The soldier married in March, 1781, in Culpeper County, Virginia, Famariah. Her maiden name, date and place of her birth and the names of her parents are not shown.

William Cardwell's widow, Tamariah, was allowed pension on her application executed March 11, 1839, at which time she was aged about eighty-one years and resided in Bullitt County, Kentucky.

She died May 8, 1843, in Jefferson County, Kentucky.

William I Cardwell, son of George Cardwell and grandson of the soldier, William Cardwell, made affidavit in Jefferson County, Kentucky, in 1852, and in that year only two of the above named children were living, Elizabeth Shirley and John Cardwell.

A brother of the soldier lived in Culpeper County, Virginia, in 1783. His name is not given and there are no further family data.

No charge is made for this service.
