Isaac Johnson a pensioner of the United States by Certificate dated the 2^d day of August 1819 at Eight dollars per month came personally into the Court being a Court of Record and delivered a schedule of his Estate which the Court valued at Eighty six dollars and fifty Cents and to which the said Johnson made oath agreeably to law. Whereupon it is ordered that the said schedule and oath be recorded and certified to the Clerk of the Court. On the 20th day of September 1820 personally appeared in open Court being a Court of Record for the said County by the Common Law Statute Law of this State, Isaac Johnson aged Twenty two years residing in said County who being first sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows. He entered in Capt. Granger's Company in the 7th Regiment formerly the 13th Commanded by Col^o John Gibson to which Taylor was Major all of the Virginia line on Continental Establishment in the Spring of the year 1779 viz^t 4th day of March 1779. That afterwards he was sent to Pittsburgh where Col^o Broadshead of the 8th Pennsylvania Regiment Commanded and attached to the Company of Captains Samuel Brady and then and in the vicinity of that place he continued to do duty in the line, and during that time he was ^{frequently} considerably distressed upon several parties against the Indians and did to exhibit the Cloie of the War. The number of his Pension Certificate is 13,707 and the date of his original application was the day of 1818. And Solo Solemly Sworn that Isaac is a Resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818. And that he has not since that time by gift, sale or any manner disposed of any property or any part thereof with intent thereby to diminish it so as to bring himself within the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled an Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States passed on the 15th March 1818. And that he has not nor has any one for me in trust any property or securities, Contracts or Debt due to me nor have I any income other than what

is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed and by me
subscribed. Vizt. Six Horses, one seven years old the other
15 or 16 years old, 1 Ald plough, 1 hoe, 2 Cows.

The Declarant is by Occupation a farmer. His wife
is 65 or 66 years of age is generally sickly and has been
under the Care of Physicians for six years, Her health
is slow declining. He has one daughter living with him,
she is married and will shortly leave him. He has one
son who will be 21 years of age on the 12th of next
October, he works for himself and the declarant
receives nothing from him.

To the Hon. John C. Calhoun Secretary of the Department of War of the United States

I Alfred Metcalf, Circuit Judge of the first Judicial District of Kentucky, & sole Judge of the District Court in said District, do certify that this day John Harrison came before me and made oath, that he is a citizen of the United States & a resident of Bullitt County aforesaid; that in the Spring of the year 1779 he enlisted as a soldier in the army of the Revolution, to serve during the war, in Capt. Jacob King's company, in the 7th Regiment of the Virginia line on continental establishment commanded by Col. M^r. Gibson; that soon after his enlistment he was appointed a corporal and served as such for about eight months when he was appointed a sergeant, and served as such till the end of the war in 1783, when he was regularly discharged; but his discharge is lost worn out or destroyed; that he does not know any person by whom he can establish the fact of his service as aforesaid, except John Harrison whose certificate is hereto annexed; that he is nearly 70 years old, feeble & infirm; that from his reduced circumstances he needs the assistance of his country for support; & that he has never been allowed any pension under the laws of the United States.

I do further state that I know John Harrison, whose certificate is hereto annexed; that he lives in Jefferson County a considerable distance from this place; that he is now aged & infirm & is not able to travel any considerable distance without great inconvenience; and that I believe that the signature to the said certificate is the proper handwriting of John Harrison given under my hand this first day of June 1818 Alfred Metcalf

Madam:

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim S. 36642 it appears that Isaac Johnson or Johnston enlisted March 4, 1779, the place not stated, served as private, Corporal and Sergeant in Captain Jacob Springer's Company, Colonel John Gibson's Virginia Regiment, was transferred to Captain Samuel Brady's Company, Colonel Brodhead's Pennsylvania Regiment and served to the close of the Revolution.

He was allowed pension on his application executed June 1, 1818 while a resident of Bullitt County, Kentucky.

In 1820 he was aged seventy-two years and referred to his wife aged sixty-five or sixty-six years and stated that he had a married daughter and his son born October 12, 1799 both living with him, their names not given. He died October 21, 1833.
