In the Court of the Hon. John C. Calhoun, Judge of the
Judicial District in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and
Sole Judge of the Circuit & County Court of Boyle, that on the
day Charles McManis, a Citizen of Boyle County in the State
aforesaid, made oath, that he was a Regularly enlisted Soldier in
the Sixth Virginia Regiment of the Army of the United States
during the Revolutionary war, that he entered the army in
the Spring of the year 1777, at Staunton in the State of
Virginia, that at that time he was a Resident of the County of
Albemarle in the said State of Virginia, that he belonged to the
Company of Captain Thomas Marcum, as an able-bodied Sergeant
in the said Sixth Regiment, Commanded a part of the time by
Colonel Thomas Posey, Colonel or Lieut. Colonel Gaskins and a part
of the time by Colonel or Lieutenant Colonel Heister, and that there
is no person living within his reach to his knowledge, by whom he
could prove the facts ~~or~~ herein set forth,

He further states that he faithfully served out the
period of his enlistment which was Five years, and that during
the term of his Service, he received a flesh wound in his right thigh in the
engagement between the American army Commanded by the Marquis
De La Fayette and the British army at Germantown upon James
River in the State of Virginia, and that by reason of the wound
received whilst in the army and the punishment he endured during his term
of Service joined to his frailty of Body and his age, being upwards of

" Fifty two years old and by reason and indigent circumstances
" he is unable of himself to procure a comfortable subsistence by hard
" labour, and therefore needs the assistance of the Government to
" procure a Support in the decline of Life,

" He further states that he was discharged from
" the army some time about the Fall of the year 1782 and
" that he was honorably discharged as an orderly Sergeant, and that
" he lost his discharge by unavoidable accidents

" He therefore applies to be placed upon the pension list
" in the Rank of an orderly Sergeant

State of Kentucky, September Term 1820.

Charles McMann, a pensioner of the United States by certificate dated the 9th day of July 1819 at the rate of eight dollars per month came personally into this Court bringing a book of Records and delivered a schedule of his Estate which the Court valued at \$129.50 cents and to which the said McMann made oath according to law.

Whereupon it is ordered that the said schedule and oath be recorded & certified. On the 25th day of September 1820 personally appeared in open Court being a Court of Records for the said County by the Common Law & Statute laws of this state Charles McMann aged sixty one years residing in said County who being first sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows. He entered in Capt. Morris's Company of which Capt. Thomas Payne soon took the command in the Regiment or Detachment Commanded by Col. Spenser and then Col. Posey to which was Major Poston all of the Virginia Line or Continental Establishment in the Spring 1779. He was at the siege of York and then marched to the southward and arrived to the end of the war. The number of his Pension is 14873 and the date of his original application was the day of

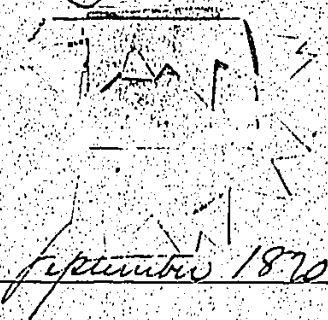
and I do solemnly swear that I was Resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby to diminish it as to being myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled an Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land & Naval Service of the United States passed on the 18th March 1818. And that I have not nor has anyone in trust for me any property, securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than

What is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed and
by me subscribed to wit. One blind mare 8 years old
valued to \$20. 2 cows valued to \$30. 30 head of hogs
valued to \$30. 3 Cows valued to \$40. one plough valued
to \$6. one axe valued to \$2. two breeding hogs valued
to \$1. 50 cents. The Declarant is by occupation a farmer. His
wife is aged, about forty five years. He has failed much in two
or three years past. He has living with him 8 Children
Four of which are daughters, the other four sons. His eldest
son is named Thomas aged about fourteen years, William
his next son is about ten years old, Felix his third son is
about eight or nine years old, Building his fourth son
is about Eighteen months old. The names of his daughters
Nancy, Polly, Margaret & Sally aged respectively about
16. 13. 5 and 3. His children are as healthy as ordinary
persons. Sworn to and declared the 25th day of
September 1870 before the Court aforesaid.
