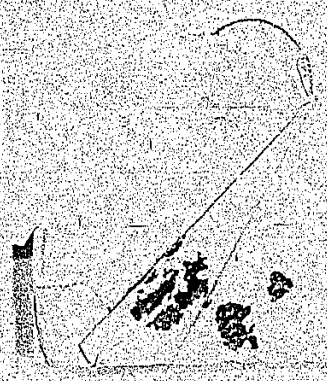

On this month's day of August  
1832 personally appeared before  
the County Court of said County

Joseph Saunders & Sheriff of said County  
who being duly sworn according to Law do the under oath  
make the following Declaration in order to obtain the bene-  
-fits of the Provision made by Act of Congress passed June  
the 17th 1832 & that he is now about seventy six  
years of age that ~~he~~ he resided in Culpepper County  
Virginia and enlisted early in Septe 1775 for the period  
of one year under Capt John Greene of the 1st Virginia  
State Regiment and that he continued in the service un-  
-till about the close of the year 1779 when he resigned being  
at that time an Surgeon in the 1st Va State Regiment  
commanded at that time by Col George Gibson the  
said Regiment being then with the Grand Army  
in Pennsylvania that in the year 1779 he was ap-  
-pointed 2<sup>d</sup> Lieutenant in the Company commanded  
by Capt John Thomas of Maj Slaughter's Corps and  
incorporated in Crockett's Regt where he served until  
the disbanding of the same at the Fall of Ohio now  
Lawsville in the close of the year 1781 and remained  
from that time to the close of the war as an officer li-  
-ble to be called on at any time when wanted that  
he hereby relinquishes every claim what ever to a pension  
on any account except the present and he declares that his  
name is not on the American Roll of any State  
Sworn to and subscribed in open Court the day and year  
above stated

And the said Court do hereby declare their opinion that  
the above named applicant was a Revolutionary War Officer  
and Soldier and should be the measure set forth by  
him in the foregoing Declaration

Sir,

The letter of Nath. P. Saunders Esq. relating to the claim of the heirs of Joseph Saunders dec<sup>d</sup> of Kentucky, has been received and is herewith returned.

Joseph in his declaration says he entered the service in Virginia as a Lieutenant in 1779 and served till some time in 1781. For this service he was pensioned under Act of 7<sup>th</sup> June, 1832, at the rate of \$320. per annum. This was the highest rate of pension which he could have received for such services. After his death his children were paid the arrears, which accrued between the time of his last semi-annual payment, and the date of his death on 13<sup>th</sup> August 1832. They have no further claims.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of Joseph Saunders, who received a pension in Bullitt County, Kentucky.

The data given herein were found in pension claim, S. 11347, based upon service of Joseph Saunders in the Revolutionary War.

Joseph Saunders, while a resident of Culpeper County, Virginia, enlisted early in September 1775, served in Captain John Green's company, 1<sup>st</sup> Virginia regiment and continued until the close of 1777, at which time he was ensign, said regiment then commanded by Colonel George Gibson. He was appointed some time in 1779, date not shown, lieutenant in Captain Mark Thomas' company, Colonel Crockett's Virginia regiment and continued to serve until the close of the year 1781.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 20, 1832, at which time he was aged about seventy-six years; the date and place of his birth and the names of his parents were not given. He was a resident of Bullitt County, Kentucky, in 1832.

The soldier died August 13, 1838, in Bullitt County, Kentucky.

Joseph Saunders was also allowed land by the State of Virginia on account of his service as lieutenant in the Revolutionary War.

Nat. P. Saunders, the soldier's son, was living in 1854. The name of Joseph Saunders' wife is not shown; there are no further data pertaining to his family.
