On this 1st day of July 1833 personally appeared
in open court Isaac Skinner ~~the son of~~ ~~son of~~
before the judge of the Buckley circuit court who being
first sworn according to law doth on his oaths
make the following declaration in order to obtain the
benefit of the act of Congress passed Feb. 22^d 1832
He states that he is now a resident of Buckley County
Ky and has been for the last few years that he is
fully thirty years old. That in the month of
September 1780 he volunteered as a Militia man
(private soldier) for three months in the company
commanded by Capt. Vencil in the county of
Louisa State of Virginia that the troops rendez-
voused at Bush Run in some Wilderness County the
commanding officer was Capt. Hagan he was
the oldest capt. and took the command as
Major. We were marched to Richmond
Virginia. When we were attached to the command
of Gen. Wood who appeared to have the
command. We were marched from Richmond
back down to Richmond when the company
to which this petitioner was belong was placed
under the command of Major. They were then
of the regular Army from Richmond this Petitioner
was marched to Petersburg and Scot this
county on the Atlantic frontier and was again

marched back to Fredericksburgh and at the expiration
of three months, this prisoner was discharged
having served the full three months in the war of
the Revolution as a friend. He had his discharge
but has lost it.

That in the month of April 1781 he again entered
as a Militia man in the company of Capt Anne
Johnson. Major Bose commanded the Battalion
He was the company joined the ~~Army~~ a portion
of the Regular Army at Millersburgh Virginia and
he served during this tour two months under the
command of Capt Coleman of the Artillery
and obtained a discharge but he has lost
the same; His first service was under Capt.
Coleman for this tour he was a Militia
man obtained in to this service

That after wards to wit in July 1781 he again en-
tered the service of the United States as a Militia
man in the company commanded by Capt
Spencer in Loudon County and he was marched
to Richmondsburgh via Warrenton to Fredericksburgh
and joined the main body of the Army near
Fredericksburgh he was marched to Park-
inson and continued in the public service
in this tour of the space of two months
He then for the war under the command of G. C.
Doubing & Major Quincy a part of this

was to the petitioner that he served
in the three terms aforesaid when included in the full
period of seven months as a militia man
in the war of the Revolution.

I do hereby relinquish all other claim to a
pension or annuity except this one. I further
declare that my name is upon the pension
roll of ~~any~~ the agency of any State

court and made ~~an~~ oath that he is person-
ally acquainted with Isaac Skinner who
has signed and sworn to the foregoing petition
that he believes him to be of the age stated by
him. He further swears that he knows that
the said Isaac Skinner served the longest
length of time stated by him as the applicant
saw him in the service and service with
him upon the terms aforesaid.

Under the date of the 6th of April, 1838, entitled "An act directing the transfer of money remaining unclaimed by certain Pensioners, and authorizing the payment of the same at the Treasury of the United States," the adm^r of Isaac Skinner, Acc^o a Pensioner on the Roll of the Kentucky Agency, at the rate of Twenty-three Dollars and 33 Cents per annum, under the law of the 7th June 1832, has been paid at this Department, from the 4th of March 1839, to the 4th March 1841.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your request for the Revolutionary War record of Isaac Skinner.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim, S. 31368, based upon the military service of Isaac Skinner, the only soldier by that name, who was from Kentucky, that is found in the Revolutionary War records of this office.

He enlisted in Loudoun County, Virginia, and served as private with the Virginia troops as follows: from sometime in September, 1780, three months in Captain Vencil's company under Major Merriwether; from sometime in April, 1781, two months under Captains Humphries and Coleman; from sometime in July, 1781, two months in Captain Noland's company, under Colonel Dabney.

He was allowed pension on his application executed July 1, 1873, at which time he was living in Bullitt County, Kentucky, aged seventy-three years.

The papers in this pension claim contain no data whatever in regard to the soldier's family.
